

(Less) Taxing Matters

Starting a New Business

Lots of us are unemployed, underemployed, or insecure about future employment. For many people, this is the time to pursue a dream. While self-employment can be extremely rewarding on many levels, there are traps for the unwary. 1Tax offers a free consultation with neighbors who are beginning or building a small business, but here I offer some issues to consider.

As you start your own business, a number of key tasks & decisions await you:

- Will you operate as a Sole Proprietorship, a Partnership, an S Corporation, or a C Corporation? Each entity offers unique issues & opportunities with regard to organization & ownership, personal liability protection, taxation of profits & losses, and treatment of fringe benefits.
- Determine if you have state or local licensing requirements. The Ohio Business Gateway can help with this; Kentucky & Indiana have different systems.
- Develop a business plan for the first two or three years. You control the detail level, but it should cover the type of business, product, or service to be offered, potential or targeted customers, pricing, start-up capital needs & sources, revenue & expense forecasts and marketing plans.
- Open a business bank account. If you use a personal credit card, designate one and keep it clear of personal transactions. It is critical to separate business and personal funds for all types of business entities. For most businesses, this is required to preserve liability protection.
- Make sure your insurance coverage is adequate. If you plan to operate from home, you may need a special rider on homeowners or renters insurance to cover liability for your actions or product, business visitors and equipment. If you have a separate location, you need property and liability insurance on the premises and equipment.
- Be sure you understand the tax filing and payment requirements you have as a business owner.
- If you pay others to help you, you must determine whether they are employees or subcontractors. There are complex special rules that determine whether a worker is an employee or a subcontractor and penalties if you get it wrong.
- Are you planning to operate your business from your home? If so, will it be convenient for you, your customers, and other members of your household? Are

there local restrictions on home-based businesses? Is there appropriate space for inventory and supplies?

- Set up a business recordkeeping system. Keep copies of invoices & receipts. Use an accounting system that's only as complex as needed and that works for you. Don't overdo it; if it becomes too complex, you won't maintain it, and you won't have the information you need to make decisions and file tax returns.
- Finally, cover the miscellaneous administrative aspects: furnishings & equipment, phone, fax, internet, voicemail, a post office box if necessary, office supplies, etc.

Pleasant Ridge Shop Hop

There's Oakley After Hours, Final Friday at the Pendleton Arts Center, and Second Sunday on Main in OTR. Now, Pleasant Ridge boasts its own monthly event, the Pleasant Ridge Shop Hop. The first Shop Hop was held this past July, and unlike the other events, the Shop Hop goes on all weekend. Each month, businesses are invited to participate in the event by offering a pre-determined discount to customers who present valid Shop Hop coupons. Coupons are available for print at www.pleasantridge.org/work.html, or they can be picked up at the Featured Business, which changes each month. The coupons are not collected so that customers can use the same coupon repeatedly at any participating business throughout the weekend.

The event was a brainchild of a local business owner who wanted to promote the "walkability" and variety offered by our business district. The idea was to encourage shoppers to come out and spend an extended period of time in the business district, visiting several shops on one trip. It also allows shops to support one another, directing customers to other businesses in the neighborhood who are also offering discounts. A customer might go into the Pleasant Perk for coffee and not even know that there is a vintage furniture store or shoe repair store right around the corner. In addition to activity on the street and business cooperation, this event is also geared to supporting our neighborhood economy by encouraging residents to shop local. According to The 3/50 Project, for every \$100 spent in locally-owned independent stores, \$68 returns to the community through taxes, payroll, and other expenditures, as compared to \$43 from purchases at a national chain.

The Shop Hop has grown and evolved over its first few months. Since the first event, the business participation has grown by 50% and logistics and communication have been vastly improved. In addition

to a monthly email and the Pleasant Ridge website, the Shop Hop has been promoted throughout the City, including the Metromix online calendar of events and the CityBeat weekly magazine. The event takes place on the 4th weekend of each month, except for December, due to the Holidays. So, prepare for a weekend of great shopping at the January Shop Hop and come experience all that our local business district has to offer!

What's this *District A* you've been hearing about?



The answer is we're your neighbors. We're a two-year-old, all-volunteer, non-profit organization creating ongoing collaboration between Pleasant Ridge and Kennedy Heights. Why? Because we believe in building a stronger regional future from the stable, diverse and family-focused neighborhoods we now enjoy. How do we do it? We uncover and count our assets together so as to multiply the benefits – and this method led to our focus on shared local arts assets.

District A is both a process and a destination, a collaborative place “where arts+community meet.” It's not your typical arts district; the artists we find among us are often living and working and raising their families here. Recently, soapbox.com (10/5/10) described our journey. “*District A* grew out of a years-old effort in the two neighborhoods to keep their business districts vital despite businesses moving out. An arts renaissance in Kennedy Heights

was sparked five years ago when community members turned vacant buildings into ‘arts anchors’ like the Kennedy Heights Arts Center and later Ballet Tech Cincinnati (now AIM) and the Green Corner and Giving Garden - a market and garden. Pleasant Ridge, a district with restaurants, bars and shops, joined the effort when its community council joined with Kennedy Heights’ council to establish the [vision for District A in 2007].”

Today *District A* is the annual “Arts & Music Festival” on the second Saturday of October. It's “Community Conversations” in businesses, arts venues and public spaces. It's the local art you can enjoy in empty windows at Ridge and Montgomery, and live, professional theater from Playhouse in the Park that you can enjoy in a variety of neighborhood places.

When *District A* connects artists, businesses and community services across

neighborhoods, our total asset base grows, even in tough economic times. *District A* is now a work-in-progress that's becoming whatever the growing community of Kennedy Heights/Pleasant Ridge will decide to create and nurture together. Let us know what you'd like that to be.

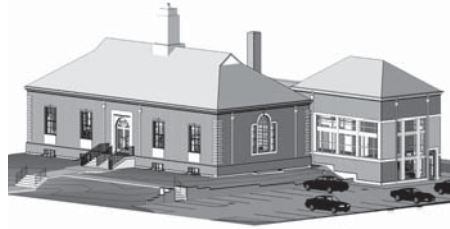

Sharing Summer Stories Helps Engage Preschoolers

“What did you do over the summer?”

This classic question is a much-anticipated jumping off point for young children to explore social studies, build language skills, gain confidence and connect to their new classroom community.

In June, each child enrolled at Pleasant Ridge Presbyterian Nursery School for the upcoming school year receives a “Summer Bag” from the school with instructions to save bits of his/her summertime inside. Children can collect anything from postcards, event tickets, photographs and maps to leaves, sticks and hand-drawn pictures. Anything that helps a child remember experiences had over the summer is appropriate for the bag. Children are natural collectors and it is never difficult to find objects to fill the bags.

When school begins, the children bring their bags in to share with the class. Each child has a designated day to show and talk about his/her summer bag collection with the rest of the class. Teachers help each child explain the significance of the summer bag artifacts and make a written and photographic record of the child’s presentation. While the children enjoy having this special moment of attention from teachers and classmates, teachers know that this experience is fostering skills that will serve children for a lifetime.

For instance, before a child can understand the concept of history, he/she must first understand that he/she has personally had experiences in the past. Relating summer experiences through the bag artifacts helps children begin to comprehend this idea in a concrete way,

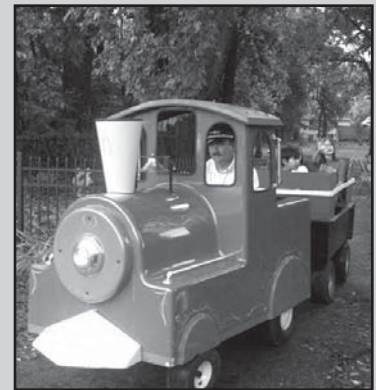
share in the varied experiences of others and realize how many commonalities there are among them. It builds a sense of belonging to the classroom community, and helps strengthen their language and listening skills.
